### Nutritional Medicine at Aldborough Surgery

From February, Glen Matten, Nutritional Therapist, will be launching a nutrition clinic at Aldborough Surgery. By offering expert nutritional advice on site his overall aim is to make a nutritional medicine approach much more accessible to people than it currently is.

With overwhelming evidence of the importance of a healthy diet to many aspects of our health, Glen will be focusing on offering detailed nutritional advice on areas such as obesity and weight management, type II diabetes, high cholesterol levels and eating for a healthy heart, osteoporosis and bone health, arthritis, nutrition for cancer prevention, IBS (Irritable Bowel Syndrome) and digestive problems, food allergy and food intolerance advice, and the nutritional management of ADHS (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder).

Glen graduated from the Institute for Optimum Nutrition in 2001 and holds clinics in Norwich and London. He teaches and lectures at a number of colleges and universities and runs popular short courses for the general public. He has fast become the face of nutrition for a number of TV series including UKTV Food's *Great Food Live* and *Food Uncut*, Sky One's *Taste* and Channel 5's *The Wright Stuff*. He is a regular sofa guest on *BBC Radio Norfolk*, writes regularly for numerous newspapers and magazines, and is currently studying for an MSc in Nutritional Medicine at the University of Surrey.

### **Items from the January meeting of the Parish Council**

**Matters arising** The Clerk had been advised that an 'electric' fence should be removed and that a hedge should be cut back; the Clerk would follow up with Norfolk County Council about the Village hall gulleys and the Eagle Road speed signs. The Council discussed a replacement site for the litter bin but were content that the existing location should be up-dated as envisaged by North Norfolk District Council. The Clerk had contacted NNDC and a joint meeting with them about the Surveyor's allotment No. 2 would take place shortly.

**Planning** Four applications had been permitted and the Council reviewed the issue of the footway near the Spreadeagle and agreed to close the matter. No further information was available on the affordable housing (Erpingham exception scheme); the Council awaited advice from NNDC.

**Finance** The Clerk had been advised that the Council should retain the Griffon grant monies until the Allotment No 2 issue became clearer; the Council decided to donate £40 to the North Walsham Citizens Advice Bureau, and approved payment of 50% of the Society of Local Council Clerks annual subscription. The Council confirmed the new rate for clerk's pay from 01.04.07.

**Notified Council business** The Clerk was asked to place a notice in 'Keeping in Touch' requesting up-dated local information for the *Welcome leaflet*, collate any new information and prepare an up-date sheet for distribution with 'Keeping in Touch' and inclusion in remaining stocks of the leaflets. Any reprint would be considered at a later stage. The council heard that a supportive landowner had indicated the availability of a 20m wide strip of land to accommodate the Erpingham sports arena (M.U.G.A.). and that the next stage would be to obtain planning permission, required in a Conservation Area.

**Reports** The Clerk was asked to follow up the repair of the Spreadeagle notice board; and in 'open session' the Council heard about future Village Hall events including that volunteers were most welcome to help with the litter pick on the playing field on 12.02.08. Keith Skipper would be part of the 'Press Gang' on 19.04.08 at the Village Hall. The Village Hall had balanced its books in 2007, the outside lighting was to be improved and some vandalism had taken place.

The **Council heard from a resident** who stated that he owned the land which NNDC had advised the Council was Surveyor's Allotment No.2, that he would oppose the waste bin refurbishment by NNDC and that he had asked BT to remove the telephone box.

## **THWAITE COMMON - Update**

Another year has gone by and there is still no sign of fencing on Thwaite Common. (Fencing is planned to allow the re-introduction of grazing, which is seen as the best conservation tool.) The management committee has not been idle all this time, so here is a quick update of where we are.

*Firstly*, we have been waiting for a change in the law with regard to the application process for works on common land (works includes fencing, drainage and so on). Until October 2007, commons managed by local councils under a Scheme of Regulation (basically by laws allowing the council to care for the common) were not part of the normal process for application – so even when we tried to apply for fencing permission, we were told that we were not allowed to! Now that law has changed, we want to put together a fencing application for part of the common a.s.a.p.

*Secondly*, the other change in the law that came into effect in October was the ability to graze animals in temporary enclosures without requiring permission from the Secretary of State; it was not clear what form this change was going to take until DEFRA drew up the guidelines in October, however, it appears that the only part of this that applies to Thwaite is the right for right holders to use temporary fencing on small portions of the common to exercise their common rights. This is not much use for the large, wet areas of the

western common, but we have been talking with the right holders about how they might wish to carry this out on other sections of the common and what grazing would be best for wildlife. The new law only allows for very small paddocks that have to be moved every month, so this will not mean fences all over the common.

*The next step* was to draw up a plan for fencing the western portion of the common. This was discussed with representatives of the parish council and the right holders in December and was subsequently modified. We need to give equal weight to access for walkers, landscape and nature conservation, as well as making sure all the needs of the animals and their owners are met. **The management committee hope to hold a public meeting in February (details to be confirmed)** to present the fencing plan to parishioners and then we can proceed with the application. In brief, the aims of grazing will be to restore the western portion of the common for public access, nature conservation and to enhance the landscape; we are not proposing a fence for the whole common, only for the western part, where the wet ground means that cutting and electric fencing are not practical. There is still a long way to go and a lot to consider, but hopefully we are on the way now! Helen Baczkowska, Conservation Officer, Norfolk Wildlife Trust

### ***Make a Date with Wildlife***

This year sees the 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of Robert Marsham – a Norfolk man who is recognised as being the ‘Father of Phenology’. What exactly is phenology? It is the study of the timing of natural seasonal events, such as the first cuckoo call or the arrival of the first swallow. Join in Norfolk Wildlife Trust’s phenology survey by **keeping your eyes peeled for five indicators of spring**. Let us know when you see the first swallow, the first clump of frog spawn, the first fully opened oak leaf, the first fully opened hawthorn flower and the first orange tip butterfly. You can look for as many or as few indicators as you like – but remember, every record counts!

Over the last few years phenology has been brought to the forefront in TV programmes such as BBC Springwatch. Phenology is now seen as an important tool in monitoring the impact of climate change on wildlife. Norfolk Wildlife Trust recognises that climate change is probably the biggest threat facing wildlife globally today. Your records will be added to data collected across the UK to help assess how climate change is affecting our wildlife.


