

The inaugural meeting in January was a great success. Following the very informative talk given by Christine Carlson, members are now undertaking a survey of garden birds.

ALDBOROUGH PARISH COUNCIL

Next meeting on **Monday 7th March** at **7.30** in the Community Centre. (NB No meeting in February.)

Items from the minutes of the January meeting (Editor's choice):

Matters arising: The **overhanging hedge** in Chapel Road has been cut back. The **planning application** for the construction of a biomass fuelled energy facility at Gresham has been withdrawn.

Care of the Green. 'Secret Gardens & Prestige Properties' had quoted for a one-off slitting/aeration of The Green (£82) and for six such treatments at monthly intervals through the summer (£300, or £50 each). The Council decided to accept the quotation for the one-off slitting/aeration, to be carried out in June or July.

As it had been too wet to cut the lower part of The Green last autumn, the Clerk had asked 'Secret Gardens' for advice. They recommended a cut in March to remove the 2010 growth and two further cuts each year, one in July when the wild flowers will have finished and the other in October. The Council decided to accept their quotation for a cut in March (£100) but to defer consideration of later cuts until the Clerk has found out if there is a Conservation Agreement concerning the number that can be made.

The meeting was suspended to allow members of the public to speak. **Mr Dennis Bacon** confirmed that the street light in Margaret Lilly Way has been repaired, and that there is now another grit bin at the Doctor's Surgery. He drew attention to the ivy growing up the pole near the Post Office, and to the need for the notice board in Thurgarton to be treated with preservative. **Mr Alex Pugh** asked if the Council had received a copy of the Inspector's Report on the inquiry into the **Local Development Framework**. He was lent a copy by **PW**, who confirmed that NNDC would be asked to adopt the two policy documents at their February meeting. **Mr Pugh** also enquired about **the Localism Bill** introduced into Parliament and was informed that a copy should be available on the internet very shortly, before the Bill's second reading. Information had come from the National Association of Local Councils on the Localism Bill, outlining Planning powers proposed to be given to local Councils to develop proposals, without restraint from the District Council, subject to a majority of more than 50% of the votes cast in a local referendum.

Police Community Support Officer's Report

Since the last meeting, one crime (fraud by false representation) has been reported and there have been seven calls to the police.

Aldbrough Cricket Club hoped to be ready to present their proposals at the next meeting.

Replacement of Play Areas

Playdale Playgrounds Limited expect to begin to install the new play equipment in the middle of February, with the work expected to take about three weeks. Mr Baron Tremain has agreed to remove the existing equipment free of charge by the end of January **JP** reported that he had not been asked to seal the appropriate documentation on behalf of the Parish Council. There were concerns expressed about receiving the grant from NCC if the

installation was not completed before the absolute deadline of 31st March. The Clerk was asked to investigate the possibility of obtaining insurance cover to meet any costs incurred if the work is delayed.

Health and Safety. There is an increase in dog fouling around the top of The Green. This will be reported to PCSO Nathan Jonas.

Planning Permission has been granted, subject to conditions, for the erection of a replacement single-storey rear extension at Fernleigh, The Green.

District Council Report **PW** reported on the difficult decisions NNDC has to make to achieve **£800,000 savings**.

Correspondence

* From NNDC about the poor state of repair of the two **litter bins** that are emptied by that Council, suggesting that they be replaced with one larger bin incorporating a 240 litre wheelie bin, and seeking comments about the location. The PC asked the Clerk to obtain more information about the design of the suggested new bin.

* From NCC with regard to **temporary road closures**, the statutory procedures involved and the need for wide notification.

* From NCC enclosing a leaflet showing their **gritting routes**. The Clerk had had an exchange of e-mails with Ms Becki Ballard about the concerns of a number of parents about the lack of gritting on the road outside Aldborough School. The PC decided to ask **DC** to help in seeking to persuade NCC to amend the gritting route into the village to go past the Spar shop and the Doctors' Surgery before re-joining the existing route.

* From Mr & Mrs Derek Hill, enclosing a copy of a letter from the Ramblers' Association about the scale of NCC's proposed cuts in their **Rights of way** budget. Possible implications of these cuts were discussed and **PW** drew attention to the responsibilities of land owners for keeping the footpaths clear.

* An exchange of e-mails with Mr Robin Gilkes, Treasurer of the Community Centre, about the possibility of the PC being able legally to make a **VAT recovery claim** in respect of the materials bought for the work on the toilets.

* The Council agreed to the Clerk attending a course in Aylsham, "**Understanding audit – the audit responsibilities of a Local Council**" at a cost of £40.

Any other business: **JP** for **BM** asked whether it would be possible to construct a soak-away to drain surface water from the parking area near the Community Centre. Owing to the present level of water on the surrounding area it is unlikely that a soak-away would be effective. The Council had decided in 2010 that the quoted cost of effecting a drainage solution was too high.

JP for **BM:** Richard King had suggested ways of showing the name of the Parish Council on the new notice board on the Green - decision deferred until the cost of the suggested plate and lettering is known.

FANTASTIC NEWS ON THE ALDBOROUGH PLAYGROUND!

The Parish Council are delighted to announce that after months of hard work, negotiation and hand-wringing over the government cuts, we are at last about to sign contracts with Playdale Playgrounds Ltd. This company has been commissioned to provide new and exciting play equipment for the children and young people of our parish and beyond.

We are confident that this will be a much-welcomed addition to our village and will be of huge benefit to children, parents, grandparents and carers!

Work is scheduled to start mid-February when the area will be securely fenced off for at least four weeks to allow time for demolition and construction. The swings have already been removed (for safety reasons) but the other equipment and the space can be used until the fencing is in place. For anyone interested, copies of the playground plan will be available in the Spar and at the Post Office.

ALDBOROUGH SURGERY extension and refurbishment.

We are starting on site on **7 February**, so car parking will not be possible from that day forward. Work will also be undertaken with regard to the visibility splay, and some bushes will have to be uprooted. As notified previously, parking will need to be used at the Community Centre, at the School's 'park and walk' site and around the Green. There will only be two 'disabled' spaces.

The building work will start on **14 February**. From then until April internal works will be undertaken to refurbish the consulting and treatment rooms: this will mean that we will not be running our full quota of clinics during this time and we ask all the patients to bear with us. We will do our utmost to keep inconvenience to a minimum. We will also advise beforehand what work is being undertaken and how it is likely to affect the service that we will be able to offer. Please note that these refurbishments will take a two week period at each upgrade.

If patients or residents have any questions regarding the extension and refurbishment I would be happy to talk to them about it on an individual basis.

Flu vaccinations are still available. Those eligible should come forward before the end of February as we do not hold vast stocks.

ERPINGHAM with CALTHORPE PARISH COUNCIL

Items from the Report of the January meeting (Editor's choice)

Matters arising: Highways repairs had been noted, with some still outstanding, and street sign requests were still in hand with North Norfolk District Council.

Planning: the single storey extension at Town House Bungalow, The Street, had been refused permission. The Council had no objection to the extension at Ash House, School Road. The Clerk had circulated a letter giving advance notice of a plan to create a caravan site near the A140. The appeal from a 2009 application for a new dwelling at Eagle Farm was refused.

Finance: North Walsham Citizens Advice Bureau had received 84 enquiries from the parish last year and the Council decided to award them £60 in recognition of its support of residents

Reprint of the "Welcome Leaflet": Two councillors had updated the leaflet and arranged for its reprint, so that it can be issued to village newcomers.

The Chairman reported interest in the **village sign project**, particularly linking it to **the Queen's Diamond Jubilee**. It was proposed that a special village event be organised and the Chairman suggested that a working party be formed involving village groups and committees. Possible types of sign were discussed and anyone or any group interested would be encouraged to submit a design. The school is to be kept informed.

Survey by Norfolk County Council about the street scene and Public Rights of Way. The document had been circulated to members and further advice had come from NCC. The Council concluded that for some services there was a benefit of economy of scale for NCC to retain control. The Clerk was asked to reply giving an indication of those services which the Council could provide locally and would like to discuss further. From the discussion it emerged that a **grit bin** was needed near the A140 (the difficult slope) so the Clerk would circulate leaflets to members and follow up with NCC.

Dates of future meetings: March 9th (to include Annual Parish Meeting at 7.00 pm), May 11th, July 13th, September 14th and November 9th 2011. In due course the Clerk would be supplied with the necessary nomination forms for parishioners to stand for the **parish council elections on May 5th 2011**.

Members' reports: The renewed glass in the **noticeboard at the Spreddeagle PH** had been broken again and more robust replacement would be required. In reference to the **housing** presentation at the November meeting the Chairman stressed the need for the Council to be kept aware of any developments. The Council heard that the **hedge at the junction of The Street and Eagle Road** was obstructing the view for drivers so the Clerk would consult with NCC. He was asked to advise NCC that the **footpath sign by the telephone box** is rotten.

PCSO A Spinks reported the recent **crime statistics** and **speeding issues** were discussed.

Next meeting: 9th March including the Annual Parish Meeting at 7.00 in the Village Hall.
